Dear Mr. Carvalho,

In response to your letter of July 11, relating to the story about Brasília do Sul Farm, please find below Cargill's positioning on the topics related to our company. It is important to reinforce that we will not comment on the historic findings from the research since this process is not related to our company. About your questions related to Cargill:

Cargill respects internationally recognized human rights throughout our own operations, supply chains and the communities where we do business, as expressed in our [Commitment on Human Rights](#). Cargill takes this commitment seriously and only source grains from producers in compliance with the Brazilian laws and those who abide by our [Policy on South America Soy](#). We have robust procedures to ensure we are respecting social and environmental restrictions – Slave Labor, Soy Moratorium, Green Grain Protocol and Embargoes (from federal and state agencies), as well as respecting regulated indigenous areas, from which we do not source grains.

According to our specific soy grievance procedure, we have confirmed that the process to demarcate indigenous land in the mentioned area of Brasília do Sul farm is not regulated yet, so there's no illegality on the local produce. If we find any violation of our policies and commitments, the farmer will be immediately blocked from our supply chain.
